### First Burial at Locust Grove Cemetery

The first burial at Locust Grove Cemetery took place on July 5, 1846 when 83 year old James Henri was laid to rest. He was the oldest man in town at the time of his death. Having outgrown the first public burying ground and wanting to keep a memorial ground more substantial than home farms, Ethan Alling purchased the land, graded it, added fencing, and

Having outgrown the first public burying ground and wanting to keep a memorial ground more substantial than home farms, Ethan Alling purchased the land, graded it, added fencing, and planted locust trees. In 1860, a stone fence was constructed to replace the original fence. The roadway leading to the cemetery was deeded in 1870 by Lewis Alling. The stone vault was constructed around 1872, used for storing bodies throughout the colder months until they could be properly buried once the ground was no longer frozen.

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### **Founding of Twinsburg**

Ethan Alling left for Ohio with three hired men, Zeri Alling, Rodolphus (called Tom) Wolcott and Lex Johnson on March 3, 1817. A sawmill was built in 1817 and a gristmill was built in 1818. In 1818, a frame barn and part of a frame house were also built. Joel N. Thompson ran a distillery in 1821.

In July 1817, Ezra Osborn arrived and settled in the western part of the township. She had "the distinction of being the first woman to be a settler in the town."

### First Railroad Comes To Twinsburg

The Connotton Valley R.R. was built in 1880 running "one-half mile east of the center" of town. It went from Cleveland to Canton and for years was known as the Wheeling and Lake Erie. The railroad brought the telegraph to Twinsburg. The American Rapid Telegraph Co. originally operated the Connotton Valley railway lines but eventually became the Postal Telegraph Co. In 1882, the first telegraph office in Twinsburg was established with Fred. B. Barber as the person in charge. Information from "Twinsburg, Ohio 1817-1917" by Lena M. Carter (p. 133-134).

even in midsummer, hanging on the line from the rear corner of her house, a cake was just out of the oven, heavily frosted, and she was at home. Swearing allegiance to her flag, I marched to the fluttering colors in quick time. Aunt Jean enjoyed, I am sure upon my mature reflection, the appreciation bestowed upon her talents.

### We visited.

On our own farm, there were four successive tenants each of whom worked the farm and occupied the rear half of the large house. The Leaches were succeeded by the family of William Hirschman, a solid couple whose fanlily grew to five children, the eldest about 2 years younger than I. Will Hirschman was a cattle dealer, but he kept a few dairy cattle and took hay and sometimes grain from the land.

Most of my growing up and my first paid work was for good Farmer Hirschman. His team of grays named Die and Doc were the first of a long line of
