The yellow Freeman House, in front of our Barn, did *not* have secret rooms - it was explored thoroughly before demolition. Were there stops in Twinsburg for the Underground Railroad? We may never know. But we *can* learn more about this most revered piece of history. David Gates, from the Summit County Historical Society, will present the program "Understanding the Underground Railroad in Ohio" after our potluck and meeting on April 13th.

We will be at the First Congregational Church, 9050 Church St. The doors open at 4:30 and we'll plan to eat at 5:00. Bring a dish to share and your own table service - we'll have beverages. There will be a short meeting following dinner and election of officers. The program is scheduled to start at 6:30. All are welcome to dinner and program or just the program!

# A JOURNEY DOWN SOM CENTER ROAD, NORTH STREET. ROUTE 91,DARROW ROAD, OR AS YOU LIKE IT

Father lived out one of his dreams of providing a home for a herd of Hereford cattle who regarded fences as challenges rather than obstacles; certainly not as limits on their freedom. They dined out much of the time. We grew agile in pursuit.

Back to Mr. Hotchkiss; he may or may not have been in his dotage, but looked forward to the day on which he would lead "the New Revolution" down Euclid Avenue in Cleveland.

Next, Mr. John R. Davies, a good and honest soul and his wife, with their three children, Denny, Oreanna, and Bob, used the house and farm, the latter to a limited extent. The Davies were from England and were gracious people with a firm work ethic. Mr. Davies, a man of slight build and small stature, was for years the sexton in the Twinsburg Congregational Church where, among many other tasks, he and the church bell engaged in a weekly tug of war. The bell never drew him clear out of sight, but the encounter always appeared to be touch and go. Sexton Davies was a man of purpose, not given to half-measures. He rang the bell.

Mrs. Davies was a cultivated lady who imparted to her three heirs a clear understanding of the essential and honored virtues -- a sweet lady and one of considerable spirit from Olde England. It was a privilege to know her.

Next down the road on the east side is a small house built for and used for many years by a hired hand on the large and well provided Bowman farm farther south.
