SOLON TO TWINSBURG

A JOURNEY DOWN SOM CENTER ROAD, NORTH STREET. ROUTE 91,DARROW ROAD, OR AS YOU LIKE IT By William T. Gillie

Part 24

Julian Fessenden, a lovable, eccentric, elderly gentleman, lived in the near-downtown area on the road. He had lost the lower half of one ear, reputedly when an automobile had knocked him forward into his own wheelbarrow.

Julian and John Schmalzle shared a mutual antipathy. A mention of either to the other was similar to pulling the pin on a hand grenade. We are now in what was the village of Twinsburg. Facing the square from SOM Center Road we find the Twinsburg Bank to our right across the street. Now underfoot is the board walk in front of Maxam's Butcher Shop. Mr. Maxam is the archetype of the craft of butcher. He is comfortably rotund, muscular, and suitably aproned for his work. His hearty smile is for every passerby as he stands in front of his shop sharpening a grown-up knife with a hand-held whetstone of about the same length as the blade. The swit-swat, switswat of his task continues throughout his inquiry into our welfare as we pass. Through the screen door, the large cutting block, its holsters full of knives, can be seen dominating the sawdust covered floor, a picture from a vanished past.

At the end of Maxam's board walk there are two wide and deep blocks of sandstone steps leading up to the well-worn stone walk past the A. E. Bishop General Store.

This account of best recollection of a trip down SOM Center Road some time during the years 1920 - 1935 must end with the arrival in town. No Spoon River Anthology here, but just the moss gathered by a stone which rolled through

This Month in History: March

March 3, 1913 - A women's suffrage march in Washington D.C. was attacked by angry onlookers while police stood by. The march occurred the day before Woodrow Wilson's inauguration. Many of the 5,000 women participating were spat upon and struck in the face as a near riot ensued. Secretary of War Henry Stimson then ordered soldiers from Fort Myer to restore order.

March 5, 1946 - The "Iron Curtain" speech was delivered by Winston Churchill at Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri. Churchill used the term to describe the boundary in Europe between free countries of the West and nations of Eastern Europe

Birthday - Wyatt Earp (1848-1929) was born in Monmouth, Illinois. He became a legendary figure in the Wild West as a lawman and gunfighter, best known for the shootout at the O.K. Corral in 1881, in which the Earp brothers (Wyatt, Virgil and Morgan) fought and defeated the Ike Clanton gan
